Course purpose/Catalog Description: Study of disease burden and health systems in high, middle and low- income countries. Emphasis on public health and entrepreneurial approaches to challenges and improvements in resource-constrained and emerging nations.

READING QUIZZES/OPEN RESPONSES: There are 14 scheduled online reading quizzes/open responses to assess your understanding of the readings. These must be completed by the specified day/time for online submission. It is imperative that you have a secure Internet connection. [SLO# 1-8] (LG #1, 3, 5)

ASSIGNMENTS: There are 6 graded assignments. These are structured to allow you (individually or as part of a group) to apply concepts to global health issues. For example, you may be asked to apply epidemiological thinking to a disease condition or analyze the specific features of a global health challenge or take a stand/debate a controversial global health policy or strategy in an emerging nation. Instructions and grading rubric for assignments are handed out in class and/or posted in BB in advance of the activity. It is important that you are present in class so you can complete these assignments. The make-up for a missed assignment is solely at the discretion of the instructor/professor. Thus attendance is strongly advised!!! [For online sections: you will be required to complete and post/upload the assignment by the specified due date/time.] [SLO#1-6] (LG #1, 3, 5)

TEAM PROJECT: In commemoration of World Health (April 7) or World AIDS Day (Dec. 7), you and 3 other students (i.e. 4 member team) will develop a promotional video for a Global Health Income Generating Venture that addresses or correlates with the WHD or WAD theme.. *Focus will be on a situating the venture within the cultural frame of a* resource-constrained or emerging nation. Your team will create and premier a 2-3 minute promotional video for a business/product that advances health in the region. <u>Team</u> and <u>region</u> assignments will occur during Week 3 of class. <u>Guidelines</u> for planning income generating venture/product pitches and creating videos, and the grading rubric are all posted in BB. [SLO #7,8] (LG 5)

EXAMS: There are TWO (2) exams (Mid-term and non-cumulative Final) with a combination of close-ended (multiple-choice and true/false) and open-ended (short answer) questions. You will have 60 minutes to complete each exam. [SLO# 1-8]

For online sections: Each of these exams will be administered via Blackboard. It is not advisable to use an unsecured WIFI connection, as this may be unstable. If you do not own a computer then you are encouraged to use a computer in one of the UNCG computer labs. Technical issues will not be accepted as an excuse for failure to complete the exam. **EXAMS CLOSE AT 11:59PM ON FRIDAY [SLO# 1-8]**

REQUIRED PROCTOR (online sections only): For both the mid-term and the final exam you will need to locate and use a verified proctor. On the Blackboard site, under Exams, there is a link to the North Carolina Proctor System. On that website you can search for local proctors. If you cannot find a suitable proctor close to you, you can invite someone to become a proctor. If that person is accepted you can use them for both exams. Please note this can take some time and you should identify your proctors quickly.

Once you have a proctor you will need to set-up a time, during the exam week, when you can take your exam with your proctor. When taking your exams you will not be allowed to have any material open in front of you nor will you be allowed to search for information on your computer or the web. The proctor will conduct a close and constant surveillance of your test-taking and will verify your compliance.

Students must schedule proctored exam appointments via UNC Online (http://online.northcarolina.edu/). Appointments should be scheduled no later than two weeks prior to exam windows. To view detailed scheduling instructions visit http://online.northcarolina.edu/exams/overview.htm.

Students must present a current/legible government issued photo ID prior to each exam appointment. Cell phones are not permitted in testing areas (leave cell phones at home or in a locked car). Students are responsible for fees related to proctored exams (if a proctor charges a fee, the fee will be displayed in the proctor's' details). Be on time for appointments (proctors are not obligated to honor misses or late appointments.).
